In light of feedback from Parent Questionnaires in recent years, we will continue to underline tasks that are more easily completed by children independently, but will also include some worksheets at the request of some families.

Explain how the music is used in the story. Give an opinion on your likes and dislikes. <u>Ask your teacher for a worksheet for Literacy.</u>	Recall the line painting skills used by Sean Scully. (see reverse). Explore the different thickness of paint that he used to create your own piece of artwork. Focus: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> explore techniques used by Sean Scully use techniques to create thick and thin lines experiment with different resources i.e. crayon, paint...
