Cave paintings were usually of animals and people. What would you like to ask a prehistoric person? Think of five interesting questions. Focus: • CL • Different questions words i.e. Why, How • ? at the end	Imagine that you are a Bronze Age or Iron Age child. You are playing with your friends. Compose a song to sing (write the words). Use a familiar tune for your song e.g. twinkle twinkle Focus: • Choose words that will fit the correct rhythm of your tune • Practise your song, singing with correct pitch	Create a map for Stonehenge. Stonehenge was begun in the Stone Age and completed in the Bronze Age. First, go to Google Maps (web link below) and type in 'Stonehenge'. Drag the little person onto Stonehenge so that it's on 'streetview' and explore! Focus: • 'Walk' around Stonehenge on the computer • Show the stones from a bird's-eye view (above) • Show the compass points • Use a key if necessary	Design and make your own Bell Beaker. Bell Beakers were created in the Bronze Age for people to drink from. You could use paper mache, clay or playdough for example. Pay really close attention to the pattern. Focus: Research Design and making Use a detailed finish
Read or listen to a story about autumn such as 'Tree', 'The Scarecrow's wedding' 'Tattybogle' or 'Leaf Man' and make a story map of all the important events. Focus: • Recalling information • Sequencing a story • Recording in a pictorial way	Use any art skill such as painting or collage to create a picture showing one or all 4 of the seasons. Focus: • Think about important features of each season • Show it by using art skills such as drawing/painting	Imagine you had transported back to the Bronze Age times. What 3 things would you miss the most and why? Focus: Making decisions Reasoning Justifying	Create your own sword – this could be from the Bronze Age or the Iron Age. See back of sheet. (You could do this with your brother or sister from Blackwell if you have one). Focus: Cutting and shaping materials Increasing stability e.g. layers of card
