We are grateful for the support of you as parents, our collaborative schools in Worcestershire and to the Governing Body for their contribution to the leadership of the school. We are particularly grateful to Dr Evans, Chair of Governors, and Mrs Wilson, Vice Chair, and thank them for their superb dedication to the school. Dr Evans has been such a tremendous support to the school for many years and will continue to be so. He has decided that he wishes to step down as Chair, whilst remaining on the Governing Body. We are immensely grateful for his dedication and support without which the school would not be the place that it is. Thank you Dr Evans.

Thanks also to the PFTA for amazing fundraising efforts during this difficult year, so essential to ensure that we can continue to offer the rich and varied educational opportunities currently available whilst the budgetary demands are increasingly challenging. I say it each year, but without the PFTA funds the school would not offer what it does. During this term alone, they have funded a complete new set of home reading books for Red, Green and Purple Classes as well as Mark Riley the artist in residence for each class. Particular mention must be made to our Year 4s and their families for their support to the school over the years.

Our results show that the children have again made strong progress, which has been supported by excellent teaching. The vast majority of children are working well towards national expectations and given a further year of 'normality' next year (without COVID closures), this progress will be maintained, supporting children's return to expected levels and beyond for their age. When they leave us in Year 4, they have developed into individuals who are mostly working securely with many at above expected standards and with life skills of independence, communication and an excellent sense of moral purpose. This group has been a joyful class of polite and hard working children and it has been rewarding to watch them develop over the years and the progress that they have made from Red Class to Blue Class has been tremendous.

The school works hard to fulfil its role as a real community school and remains at the heart of the village. The work we do supports children in developing that sense of community and their own role within a community and as part of the UK. Developing the children as local and global citizens is an important aspect of our work as could be seen during our Collective worship themes on values. Our community work this year on 'Tea and Toast', development of the back playground and the Summer Fair have all served to unite us. Finally, I would like to say, on behalf of everyone at school, thank you for your support and your kind words throughout the year. Good luck to adults and children who are moving on, we wish you well and hope that you come back to see us. ## **Reports**

This week, you will receive your child's report and there is a covering letter to help you understand how your child is achieving in line with the national standards. It is most important that you look at the children's progress comment as this indicates whether they are working well. Whilst some children do reach this high national standard, it is important that you do not feel that your child is unsuccessful if they are not currently working at the standard. Some children are not, and this is not unexpected as learning has been disrupted during the previous few years and some are still closing the gap. It is also important to remember that children develop at different rates and that many children who may be described as not working at the expectation when they are very young, will go on to reach expectations later on during their primary school years. It is also important to note the general comments and skills development sections as these indicate your child's development in areas that are crucial to their future as learners.

# <u>Summer Holiday 'Keeping up!'</u>

Over the summer, the children need a good rest and break from school. Due to the disruption over the past few years, however, it is important to keep the children reading. Please keep them reading their ebooks (Red, Green and Purple Classes), reading books of their choice (Yellow and Blue Classes) and

-Watch stories read by their teachers (on BFS YouTube) and -Spelling and mental maths activities.

The teachers may also send some particular work home for individuals who they feel would benefit from specific work. Please support them with this learning and keep reading!

### Collective Worship

During this last week, we have concentrated on 'Changes' to help with transition as well as 'Freedom' as a theme and discussed the freedom that comes from living in the UK and the associated rights that we have. With such rights come responsibilities, and we talk (as part of British Values) about the need to follow the law and what this means. As part of this work, we discuss the lack of freedom for some people across the world and discuss this in terms that the children understand, such as a lack of freedom to go to school, have friends, wear what they want, choose a job and have beliefs that are different from others.

Thank you to families for continuing to pay for school trips which form such an important part of the children's educational experiences but which cannot be funded by school.

#### New room

Whilst school budgets are stretched more than ever before over the last 25 years, all schools receive a small grant for building works each year in order to enable small repairs. We have saved ours for a number of years in order to build a small room next to the offices so that there is a space for a small staff room as currently there is no dedicated space in school.

The BFS staff members are incredibly dedicated and hard working and governors are so pleased that they can in a small way acknowledge how fortunate the school is to have such wonderful staff.
