TO SUPPORT LANGUAGE DEVELOPMENT AND SPEAKING AND LISTENING SKILLS: Tell an adult about what you have learned about an infamous real-life pirate or the role of Sir Francis Drake. Speak in full sentences using correct grammar (remember it's would have, could have, should have and must have not must of) and use good word choices to make your speaking interesting to listening to. Practise spelling the following words on their own and in simple sentences: material, mention, medicine, minute, notural, naughty, notice, occasion, occasionally, often, opposite, ordinary, particular, peculiar, perhaps and popular It's a good idea to learn a couple a day or five a week and keep revisiting them to help memorise them over time.
