<p>Write some sentences about Pocahontas. This activity links to the first humanities activity. You might want to do that first.</p> <p>Focus:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Full stops and capital letters • Finger spaces between words. • Check for sense. 	<p>Make a Native American headdress.</p> <p>Focus:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Measure round your head for a headband. • Draw a design on your headband. • Make or use feathers – attach them to your headband using glue or tape. 	<p>https://www.ducksters.com/history/colonial_america/pocahontas.php</p> <p>Use the website to find out 5 facts about Pocahontas.</p>	<p>Write numbers from 0 to 20 in order accurately. Make sure you form them correctly too.</p> <p>Focus:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Start numbers from the top. 
<p><u>Use the letters in Pocahontas to make as many words as you can, e.g. pan. Write the words that you find in your homework book.</u></p> <p>Helpful hint:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Write each letter on a piece of paper that can be moved around to make new words. 	<p>Make a bow and arrow. (See Mrs Cain's YouTube film)</p> <p>Focus:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Find a long, thin stick that is quite bendy to use for the bow. • Use string to join both ends of the stick together. • Use sticks and feathers to make your arrows. 	<p>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=TwgAG_X_wG8</p> <p><u>Watch the story of Hiawatha, a little Native American boy.</u> <u>Think about the reasons why the animals helped to rescue Hiawatha from the bear.</u></p>	<p>Use a dice. Roll twice and add the numbers together. Write number sentences. $6 + 4 = 10$ or $10 = 6 + 4$</p> <p>Focus:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Add the dots altogether • OR start from the largest number – say the number. • Count on the smaller number using your fingers. • The total is how many altogether?
<p>Write instructions for how to make a bow and arrow. You will need to think about the resources you will need and the steps you need to do to make your product.</p> <p>Focus:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Order instructions with numbers • Think carefully about the steps • Use full sentences 	<p><u>Listen to music of the Native American people (see website below).</u></p> <p>Focus:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Listen carefully • Record what the music reminds you of in a picture form. 	<p>Find out about a famous Native American. Why do you think they were famous? What was good about their actions?
